Omnibus Bill



The 2014 Economic **Impact of The Beef** Industry to Washington State

Although the beef industry is widely recognized as an important agricultural commodity, few studies exist evaluating its overall economic importance to the state of Washington. Washington State University's School of Economics recently conducted a study to evaluate the economic contribution of Washington's beef industry to the state economy for 2014. Inputoutput analysis was used to estimate the indirect and induced effects that result from the beef industries input purchases, labor and profits. The total economic contribution of the beef industry to Washington is \$5.691 billion.
