

What I do remember is Cindy, the 4th grader who lived on the same block, doing a practice walk to school with me so I would know the

town, it was also home to several families with kids that were a little older than me. Age matters little to kids in small towns. The town of Prescott had a population of fewer than 300 people. I would be joining a 6<sup>th</sup> grade class of 18 students in total, one of the bigger classes in the school that housed all 12 grades together.

What I remember most from that first day of school was the humiliation. School had always been very easy for me. I picked up every new lesson or skill effortlessly. I never understood why some things, whether math or spelling, were difficult for some students. I got to thinking I was special. Starting as a new 6<sup>th</sup> grader, I had nothing but confidence that I would succeed academically and prove myself the brightest in the class again. Pride cometh before a fall.

On that first day of 6<sup>th</sup> grade, when it came time for Language Arts, my ancient teacher gave the class sentences to diagram. What? I had never diagramed a sentence. I had never heard of diagramming sentences. I stared dumbly at the teacher as the other students happily diagrammed away.

The teacher called me up to her desk and kindly tried to teach me how to diagram sentences by asking me questions. "What is the subject of this sentence?" I said nothing. Just smiled dumbly as my face started to redden. "Here it is. What's the predicate?" Predicate? What the heck is a predicate? More dumb smiling as I was panicking on the inside, my face getting hotter and redder with each question about clauses and parts of speech. I wanted to disappear. Before this moment, I had no clue what it was like to not understand the teacher. Now I knew.

I was saved from a full-blown panic attack by the recess bell. Alas, the whole schoolyard went straight into their routine game of capture the flag. Just like diagramming sentences, I didn't know how to play capture the flag. So, I stood with the teacher along the sidelines as she tried to explain the game to me. I didn't get it. Worst first day of school ever.

But all's well that ends well. By the time I graduated from 8th grade I had built a resume only possible in a town of fewer than 300 people. From ASB president, to cheerleader, to starting point guard on the basketball team. I also played in the pep band and was manager of the high school basketball team.

With so much success, I am one of the only people I know who re-



members 8th grade as one of the best years of their school life. I wish I had a copy of my 8<sup>th</sup> grade graduation valedictorian speech.

As fate would have it, I was to have one more first day of school as the new kid. I was told that after I finished the 8<sup>th</sup> grade in Prescott, we would be moving back to our house in Spokane Valley.

You might think this news would be devastating to me. I was a great, big fish in a tiny, little pond. I would have to start all over again. But it turns out, I like starting over. And I was thrilled at the prospect of moving to the city. I wanted to be a part of the "real world" of teenagers that I saw in movies and on TV. I wanted to go to a school where I didn't know everyone, and everyone didn't know me. That's exactly what I would get on the first day of school as a 9th grader at North Pines Junior High School. I knew no one. No one knew me.

My plan was to turn out for the softball team that fall. It would be a good way to make friends. My dad heard a rumor that summer before I started school; the North Pines softball girls had a reputation for being mean. Gulp. I spent that lonely summer with stomach issues, the physical manifestation of my fear and anxiety.

The first day of school came. I was excited. I was terrified. I vomited. Junior high can be an unkind place.

As I opened my locker and put away my stuff, preparing to go to my first class, a girl came up next to me and did the same.

"I'm new here," she said. I turned and saw a huge, beautiful

"Me too," I said, smiling back.
"You going in there?" She gestured with her head to the nearest classroom, still smiling.

"Yeah," I said, still smiling. I felt the terror inside begin to subside, my stomach start to calm.


Just like that, I wasn't alone on the first day of school. I took a deep breath. We entered the room, took seats together, and became fast friends.




















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## The Importance of Benificial Ownership Information

In the ever-evolving and swirling world of business regulations, the Beneficial Ownership Information (BOI) reporting requirement is the latest must-know for companies operating in the U.S. If you're a business owner, you might be wondering, "What on earth is BOI, and why should I care?" Well, strap in, because we're about to dive into the nitty-gritty of BOI, its purpose, and the consequences of ignoring it. Don't worry, we'll keep it as entertaining as possible. Because busi-

ness compliance is fun, right?

Right.

What is Beneficial Ownership Information (BOI)?

BOI is essentially a way for the U.S. government to peek behind the corporate veil to see who really pulls the strings in a company. It's all about transparency. The Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN), part of the U.S. Department of Treasury, wants to know who the beneficial owners are; the individuals who either have substantial control over a company or own at least 25% of it.

#### Why is BOI Important?

The BOI requirement was established under the Corporate Transparency Act, enacted in 2021, and it aims to prevent nefarious activities such as money laundering, tax evasion, and other financial crimes. By knowing who the real owners are, regulators can better combat these illicit activities and ensure the integrity of the financial system. Shell companies that are owned by shell companies that are owned by some conglomerate that is owned by a limited liability company (LLC) in Florida can still exist, it's just that there will be an actual human, or group of humans, that are tied to those entities.

#### Who Needs to Report?

Not every business is captured in the BOI net. The requirement primarily targets corporations, LLCs, and other entities created by filing documents with a state or similar office. Sole proprietorships, for instance, are generally excluded from the reporting requirements if they didn't need to file to start their business. There are also 23 categories of business type exemptions, including publicly traded companies and nonprofits, which are already under the watchful eyes of other regulatory bodies. Some examples here would include banks, public utility companies, accounting firms, insurance companies, etc. It might seem odd that many of the categories of businesses that are excluded are financial in nature, as it would make sense to keep a close eye on them. The rationale there is that, since these business types are already heavily scrutinized by various state and federal authorities, they get a pass on the BOI front.





#### **Deadlines and Filing Process**

If your company was created before January 1, 2024, you have until January 1, 2025, to file your initial BOI report. Companies formed in 2024 have 90 days from their creation notice to file, while those formed in 2025 and beyond have a mere 30 days. Any changes in your company's ownership or control must be reported within 30 days.

To file, you'll need to gather details about your beneficial owners, such as names, addresses, and ownership percentages. Then, head over to Fin-CEN's secure portal and submit your report. The good news? There's no fee for filing. The other bit of good news is this: if your business structure is relatively uncomplicated (a single member LLC, for example), the filing process can be completed in 15 minutes or less.

#### **Consequences of Non-Compliance**

Choosing to ignore the BOI requirement comes with a hefty set of risks. Non-compliance can lead to civil penalties of up to \$500 per day and criminal penalties, including fines up to \$10,000 and up to two years in prison. So, unless you fancy a stint in the slammer and/or stiff fines, it's best to keep a keen eye on your BOI obligations.


#### Where to File

Ready to file your BOI report? You can do so through FinCEN's official website: HYPERLINK "https://fincen.gov/boi" \hhttps://fincen.gov/boi. Just make sure you're not falling for any scams; FinCEN has warned of fraudulent attempts to solicit information and payments. Remember, there's no fee to file, so don't send money to anyone claiming otherwise. Double-check that you are going to the legitimate government website as this is an arena that is, somewhat ironically, rife with scammers. Be on your toes.

#### **Final Thoughts**

BOI reporting might seem like just another bureaucratic hurdle, but, in my view, it's a crucial step in promoting transparency and fighting financial crime. Whether you're a seasoned business owner or a startup founder, understanding and complying with BOI requirements is essential. So, embrace the transparency, file your report, and keep your business on the right side of the law.

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

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## Riding the Elephant on the Right Path

The secret to changing healthy habits, or any life habit really, is to ride an elephant. No, really!

Some readers may have heard of the great Hannibal of Carthage. During the height of Rome, he was one of a very few that could push back on

the Roman military and consistently give them losses. His forces occupied and held lands in Italy for over 15 years.

What was the secret to his success? Literal elephants.

What was his ultimate cause of failure? Literal elephants.

What is the secret to your successes and failures? Figurative elephants.

In ancient-times battles, an elephant rider had a massive advantage. How are some gladiators with pokey sticks supposed to contend with a charging elephant? No wonder Rome struggled!

An elephant rider can be a powerful ally, and one that should be employed deliberately. But an elephant can also be an expensive, unruly beast that is difficult to tame if guided by the wrong plans and kept on the wrong terrain.

The book *Switch* by Chip and Dan Heath uses the analogy of an elephant rider to demonstrate the three forces involved with all human behavior. This model offers a model for how to consistently create healthy habits and routines that see victory. You'll build routines that stick. Or...ignore it and suffer the weight of an elephant lying in your way.

The elephant rider analogy has three components. Two are fairly obvious: the rider and the elephant.

The rider is our logical self. The rider holds the reins and guides the elephant in the direction the rider wants the elephant to go. We know the destination, we have the fitness and nutrition guides, we have the plans.

The elephant on the other hand is our emotional side. Our elephant is the big beast of burden that does all the work. When that elephant is going the direction that the rider wants, then things are smooth. We ride to victory.

But if the elephant doesn't go where the rider wants it to? What if the elephant wants

What can the rider do?

Our emotional side is simply too big and powerful to get pushed over by logic. The rider certainly can direct and get the elephant started on the right path, but it's definitely the least powerful between the two (ever experience emotions overpowering your plans?).

To have a successful partnership and move towards our goals, we need to direct the rider with a clear plan. What are you going to do? We also need to motivate the elephant to keep it emotionally on our side as well by remembering why change is important to us personally.

Did you catch the missing piece though?

There are three parts to the elephant rider model. The little rider, our logical side, gives directions and plans to the large elephant, our emotional side, so they can get to the destination. But they both need to travel together over a path, and the path has the ultimate say.

It doesn't matter if the rider knows where to go, and the elephant wants to get there, if the path is frightfully decrepit. An elephant simply won't cross when the path is too rocky and hurts its feet. You can't get there when a canyon lies in front.

If the rider is our logical side, the elephant is our emotional side, and the path is our environment. The environment around us shapes our behaviors tremendously, for better or for worse. Consider this: if you have a packet of Oreos on your kitchen counter, are you more or less likely to eat junk food? What if that were a bowl of fruit instead? The environment shapes our behaviors in subtle and not-so-subtle ways.

I think the biggest issue people run into with habit change is that they think creating a plan is enough. This can get you started, to go left when the rider says to go right? but, most likely, it won't last. We want to

direct the rider with a plan, motivate the elephant with our reasons why, and shape the environment to make the path easier to walk.


